PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and I intend to continue to do so. Senator Landis can say what he wants to in trying to construe this. I just look at the language in the bill where it says the finding that this board makes will be based on the impact of participant spending. So if he's going to find something else somewhere else that says something different it's like I find one thing in the Bible over here in Genesis, you go to Leviticus and find something else, then Senator Connealy goes to Exodus and Senator Baker goes to sleep, I mean goes to Revelation. (Laugh) It just indicates there are contradictions and inconsistencies in that book, just like there are contradictions and inconsistencies in this bill.
