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SENATOR LANDIS: No, that number is an amount that the multiplier could be.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: There are multiple multipliers, there is one for construction, there is one for retail; economists have multiple multipliers. However, they are a number themselves, and they are like a number that you would multiply by, and that number that you multiply by can't be larger than two...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Why...

SENATOR LANDIS: ...according to that sentence.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...why is the term multipliers used only in connection with participant spending? You don't see the term multiplier or multipliers in connection with construction or anything else, but it is used right here where it says you will determine this on the basis of the impact of participant spending and then the multipliers will not exceed two. You don't find that anywhere in connection with anything else, do you?

SENATOR LANDIS: Yes, and if you gave me a moment...go ahead, I'm sure you've got something you want to talk about, but let me try to find you the place where I think there are multipliers that are mentioned.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I think my time is up on this, but we'll get...

SENATOR LANDIS: Okay.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...another shot at it when you find it.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers, you're recognized to close.
