you gave it sounds quite well, but I would remind you that DEQ has the power to tell a livestock facility how they can operate. And so if there's...if there's something going on that's wrong out there, they have the power to make them change and it is...it...if we withdraw the word "suggested" it might be that we are not going to allow them to use new technology that comes along. I think both of us could become confused on this, but, quite obviously, if a livestock facility is not...is in noncompliance we could have a problem. But as I read the bill and as we've tried to interpret this, if we remove the word "suggested" we may be precluding the livestock waste management facility from using new technology that comes along at a later point in time. If you just take out the word "suggested" you could be very confining to that livestock facility. Of course, if they're out of compliance with...with their permit, DEQ certainly has the power to do whatever is necessary to make sure they are in compliance with their permit and they're not causing problems to the waters of this state. So I'm not quite sure here how to respond to what you're saying, but I'm afraid if we remove the word "suggested" then we may in the future be precluding a livestock waste facility from using the best technology practices that might be coming along. And, of course, if you're referring to odor we think there will be advancements in odor control in the future. We don't know that for sure but we think there will be. So, you know, probably the best management practice to control odor is to cover the lagoon. In Colorado they did that, but they'll be...they won't be locating any new livestock facilities in that area of the state that have lagoons because it's cost prohibitive to cover it. So, in some cases, it may be prohibitive to use the best management practices, so I think that's probably the reason we have the word "suggested" in there and I want to be reasonable and I want to get along and I want the livestock industry to use the best management practices they can in this state. But if you take the word "suggested" out and...it could be that the requirements could be so restrictive that they may not be able to operate in this state. I must say I'm a little confused here and your argument sounds good on the surface. Maybe this is something you and I need to get together and talk about with the industry at the close of the session today, but I'm not quite sure that I'm ready to accept this yet because we could be too restrictive. So I'll explore this further with you if we can,
