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rid of it once and for all. Don't vote for it. That's my advice, and I'm not going to. I hope enough of you will not vote for it, if we ever get to it, so it won't come back again this year, I hope, unless they can find some other place to try to put it.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Her advice, sir, is don't vote aye, sir, and I think...I think Senator Crosby has swayed me. Senator Crosby, you gave some good things that a person could do while waiting in line, but here's what often happens. When anything is being discussed, it can be dragged out in such a way that an event which takes next to no time will seem like it's taking an eternity. We all, when we go to the grocery store, do stand in line, as Senator Crosby pointed out. Some grocery stores now have a little device up near the checkout counter through which you can drag a card, then people sign pieces of paper and they run punch buttons on whatever it is they are punching buttons, and that takes time. Other people stand up there and write out checks, and then they fill out the little book that they tore the check out of, and that takes time. Some people check the price list that they got, and that...everything almost that anybody does who's concerned about his or her money will take time. But it's only when we get to this idea of dispensing liquor that everybody's time is so extremely important that putting a signature in the book of life, Senator Hilgert, this is like the book of life to a retailer, takes too long, and the ones complaining are not people who stand in line, but retailers, retailers. One retailer said that while people are signing the book, others are stealing (laughing) the cigarettes, and I suggested that they might be in teams. The one who signs the book will take a long time to write a signature. Well, all you have to do is tell that fellow go buy your liquor someplace else. You're not responsible enough to drink liquor that you buy from me. You cannot even responsibly handle signing your name to a book and you think I'm going to consider you responsible enough to consume this alcohol. Give me that back and get out of my store. That's the way you handle that. Then you see, all of a sudden, Flash Gordon putting a signature down if he wants the liquor. When those kind of arguments have to be given, it's clear that the people holding that position have no
