Senator Hartnett doesn't care about this bill. Let me ask him a question before I draw that conclusion. Senator Hartnett...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...do you care about this bill?

SENATOR HARTNETT: Yes I do.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If that's the intent and it has a delayed bill...a delayed date, do you care enough about it for us to pass it into law with its delayed date? Do you care that much about it?

SENATOR HARTNETT: Not this session, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So then you don't care about it. If this session is the only time we're going to deal with the bill, you don't care about it, do you?
