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and accounting services, and \$45,000 would be used to expand outreach activities. If now you're just asking for \$25,000, what's not going to get done?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: A little less of everything, I presume, Senator, and I haven't asked that specific question. I just asked them what was the bottom line they needed to stay in operation, and that's what they told me. So I'm...what this allows them to do is get the federal match, which brings in an additional \$180,000, and I understand that it is...it would be very, very difficult for them to even stay in business unless they get an infusion of funds from us in this amount.

SENATOR HUDKINS: All right, thank you very much. I'll turn my time back.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Hudkins. Senator Schimek, your light is on next.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Schmitt, I would like to give some of my time, if he would like it, because he did tell me that he wanted to say a word or two in support of the amendment. Before I turn over some time to him, I would like to say, Senator Wehrbein, I realize this issue did come up yesterday, but I also think that it came up very late and that you were all heading towards the floor to do the cloture vote, and it really didn't get maybe as much of an airing as perhaps it should have, and I just wanted to point that out to the body. I think that if it...if it does get a good discussion here, that it has the potential to be successful and I felt a responsibility to that commission to bring it to you. And, Senator Schmitt, would you like the rest of my time?

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Schmitt?

SENATOR SCHMITT: Yes, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Schimek. I just wanted to say, I haven't been very supportive of these commissions but just last week, I believe it was, we voted on a claims bill, and a constituent of mine had overpaid the state \$25,000 in taxes that wasn't owed to the state, so I
