Corrections saying, because this is supposed to be community corrections, programs will be contrived or fabricated at the top and imposed on various communities, it was decided that since "community" is the watch word you will start with the community, and those communities having a problem which they felt could be solved with some assistance would be allowed to formulate a program whose intent was to keep people from being locked up. And that's what the program is working toward. A turf battle should not be allowed to unravel that. But if the unraveling starts with this program, then it ought to carry all the way through. Do you know we used to have guys who'd come into the barbershop who were losing their hair and they had one hair and they let it grow so long that they wound it around their head and it looked like they had hair on their head and when you got ready to comb it, he said, don't comb it. And you say, well, why? He said, if you did that, you'd understand. You'd get ready to...start with the clippers, he's say, don't cut it. Why? Because if you cut it in the wrong place the whole thing is gone. This legislative process is like that one hair. When you cut it then other things may wind up being cut also. I was explaining to my seatmate or asserting that the area of Corrections is the most politicized portion of this budget and Corrections, crime, punishment, prosecution, all this kind of thing, will always be fragmented, always, because it has never been left in the hands of the professionals, but it is the preserve of politicians because they can generate...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.
