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Senator Wehrbein or Senator Pedersen or anybody else around here, even Senator Schmitt, with his...with his knowledge of gun ranges, can actually tell you what the real costs should be. I guess the people who are in the process of trying to develop this are the ones that have the most expertise and I suspect it comes down to a situation where we say you don't need to make it that big or you don't need to do some of these things. There are probably some things they don't have any choice. In order to make it adequately safe and provide the kind of training that people are required to have in the field of law enforcement today, there are some things that just naturally have to be done in order to comply with not only federal statute and state statute but just good common sense to make sure that people are safe when they go on these ranges to practice and become experts in the field of weapons. And again, you know, I was in law enforcement many, many years ago and the way I got in law enforcement is somebody gave me a gun and a badge and I became an officer of the law. You don't do that anymore. I didn't have any training in guns, but, you know, I never used a gun, except to carry it around in my glove compartment. So things do change. As I said, things change in all fields of endeavor where...where we, first of all, want to make sure that safety is a prime...prime factor in this whole process. So I'm not going to support the amendment to take the money out and I would hope that once we do, in fact, allow them to build a range that's adequate for the people who are going to use it that good enough judgment will be used to build the kind of facility need at the smallest amount of cost that they can incur and we can move ahead. So with that, I'll relinquish the rest of my time back to the Chair, and thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Bruning.

SENATOR BRUNING: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, I rise in support of the Dwite Pedersen amendment, despite the drubbing I took several minutes ago (laugh) from my friends and colleagues here. And I tell you, as you listen to the debate today, really, when we're talking about Corrections and shooting ranges and State Patrol, we've only got one person, wherever Schmitt's at, Senator Schmitt, who's actually trained on a shooting range as a member of the State Patrol; we've got one person, Senator Pedersen, who's actually worked in Corrections.
