look at it and see is this something that has had adequate debate. I would say that we need to go back to the drawing board and introduce this as a bill if we've got the money to do it, instead of just sticking it in under another facility and getting...getting something that at this time we don't know what it costs. If we go by what Senator Tyson said, it's going to cost this and far more to build a good range. So can we save this money now and lease the time from another range and make some kind of a deal? We are spending money, people, as you all know, and we keep saying we're going to cut, we're going to save, and I (inaudible) in one and a half million dollars worth of places where we can save and not even the administration wants to take a look at it. I think we need to take some close looks and some understanding. Do they really need this Legislature to decide who's spending the money and who isn't? We could all go home and let the bureaucracies and the Governor's Office run this place without us if we are not needed to bring this kind of stuff forward. And I'm not angry about this. This is just an honest feeling that I have. Why...this is why we come here, and I think we need to take a good look at this. And we all bring our own expertises, but we just rubber stamp everything that comes in here. We are not sent here to do that. And I'm not...I've never held anybody for how they voted on one of my bills or one of my amendments and I will not do that, and I will not vote "no" on yours just because you voted "no" on mine. I don't do that. But I want us to take a look at how we're spending money and how this...
