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the reasons for the big expense in this one is its long rifles and much as the thing that Senator Tyson spoke to, the backstops, the high-quality steel for stops, the length of the field, all those things that...that's what adds a lot of the cost to this. If I may, I don't want to take all your time,...

SENATOR SCHMITT: No, that's fine. That's fine.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...I have some more to come.

SENATOR SCHMITT: No, that's fine.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: But talking about coordinating and so forth, they have assured me in the hallway that they share these facilities now with the Patrol and the police, but they don't have adequate space to do the kind of training they need, and so there is sharing. I don't know that we have a master plan for rifle facilities or weapons training facilities across the state. Probably we don't, because each law enforcement unit tends to have some of its own areas. Now, remember, we tried to make big progress on this last year by sharing the state training at Grand Island.

SENATOR SCHMITT: Um-hum.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: But this is Corrections. I can't answer all the detailed questions of whether we could build one giant weapons training in one site and have it, although it's my understanding that they need long rifle training. That's the...one of the few here in the state that will be new down at Tecumseh. And Grand Island has one that I don't think is big enough to handle all the training. And I...I can't help but think, and I don't know this and I'll stand corrected, but in this day and age we're asking for a lot, lot more training than we ever have in the past, so part of this is increasing a need for facilities for increased training and accuracy, and I think it's a civilian safety issue.

SENATOR SCHMITT: And I agree with...I agree with that, Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I didn't mean to take all your time.
