almost cynical, but it...that's the way I feel in this area. (Laugh) You know, I got to grinning back here and thinking, just give them whatever they want and they'll be happy and we'll be okay with it, until we get home and our constituents say, where did you save, where did you cut. We didn't cut. The word that keeps coming up is safety on this particular facility that they now have. It's not a safe facility. I'm hearing it. Did it just become not safe overnight? They're using it today and they're not going to have a new one done for at least two years. Senator Jones already said that. This is a separate facility, not part of the prison but proposed with the prison budget and put in the...and will be in the same area. If they put it in Tecumseh, we will have to have all those people get on the highway that need this training from our prison in Hastings, from our prison in York, from our prisons in Lincoln and prisons in Omaha to come down there and train, so mileage is a silly thing to be considering because mile...it's a wash. You're going to have to travel wherever they put it, so why not travel to one we already have? Has there been any consideration about using the Lincoln Police Department one? Has there been any consideration about using some of those that are already built? This is another area that I'm telling you it's just the beginning. We have it there, we're going to have to hire more staff to take care of it, we're going to have to...this is how the bureaucracies grow and all of us know about that. About three years from now we'll have a new prison on line, 960 beds with 435 new employees, and I'll bet you we'll have the same amount of prisoners we have today without that, with very little, because the crime rate is going down. The length of time we keep is holding them in there. Safety, if we were concerned about safety we wouldn't be taking more prisoners and jamming their time instead of paroling them. We parole. We jam more people than we parole in the state, far way more. And some of that is because of law, but some of that is straightening out. That law has been changed. And if we do fill it, I can guarantee you it won't be with new criminals. It will be with old ones that we've done nothing with but warehoused once again. And we'll have at least 500 prisoners that we now have go to single cells instead of double cells. Tell your constituents that, that we're going to give them back the private cells. You really want to be tough on prisoners...
