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mandating this one...this across-the-board mandate on all residential property. That's one of the key sources of my frustration with the...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR HILGERT: ...with the process...or, with what happened in the process. And I hope that the process does have the opportunity to perhaps rethink, maybe put Roger Morrissey to maybe a greater test and demand more information, et cetera, whatever that needs to be done, but take a second look and give Douglas County the opportunity to do the right thing and somehow escape what I think would be an inappropriate across-the-board mandated increase on residential property. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Hilgert. Senator Kristensen on the Quandahl amendment.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. And I rise to object to the Quandahl...I shouldn't say object. I would not support the Quandahl amendment. But I must make the observation before I start, about the process, that it...the people who experienced large valuation increases...and those have not occurred yet, because obviously, the TERC's work is not done in this area, and there will be other hearings, as has been acknowledged...but that your first reaction oftentimes is, how can you do that? How can that be fair? And that will be true of absolutely every area who has experienced revaluation. It's happened in Douglas...or, not...it hasn't happened in Douglas County, but it has happened in Lancaster County, where the assessor took some very, very bold steps. He did the right thing...I mean, to the point of the...for his own personal safety. But it was done. And so I appreciate the reasoned response and the reasoned comments this afternoon, this evening, made by the Omaha senators, because this is very easy to get extremely wound up on and emotional. But I do want to put into perspective a couple reasons. The process is not bad. The process of the TERC is fundamentally a sound process, because that's what our constitution requires us to do. And there are two types of equalization. And when you say it's not fair that we have across-the-board types of increases, that's one of the few remedies that is available,
