

TRANSCRIPT PREPARED BY THE CLERK OF THE LEGISLATURE
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LB 267

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 267. An amendment by Senator Janssen was adopted on May 3. An amendment...the next amendment I had to the bill, Mr. President, is by Senator Landis. Senator Landis, AM1466. (See page 1720 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Landis, you're recognized to open on Amendment 1466.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature. I've had conversations with Senator Janssen. We have had, as you know, loggerheads on this issue. And we've...we have talked about some things that would resolve this, and they are not contained in this amendment. I've asked to have them drafted. Let me tell the body what we've talked about. What we've talked about is to establish the...well, there's a difference as to how important and how much of a problem we think there is, so we're going to allow the precedent to be made, and yet at a reduced amount. Senator Janssen and I are going to suggest to the body, I think jointly...I think...that we would use, on the second offense in four years for the sale to minors or overselling, that we would use 48 hours, not 10 days. On the third offense, somebody now has really screwed up big time with a lot of notice, and we would move to 15 days. There are some other provisions that are concerning the sale of...the use of a license for food service at a public university. And Ray and I have talked about the use of the book, although I know the body has had some concern about that, and Senator Chambers just told me he had a concern about that issue. I'm not exactly sure how to address this other than, I've got something being drafted as quickly as possible, and it'll come down as quickly as I can. That's where things stand. I'll answer any questions and do what we can.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Landis, your light is on next. Do you want to continue, or do you want to waive off? And then Senator Janssen, followed by Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR LANDIS: Mr. Lieutenant Governor, I'd waive my time to Senator Janssen for his remarks, his concerns, and to recite whatever thoughts he has on the subject.
