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also to the juveniles who are violating the law and consuming alcohol on our streets and sometimes in our schools. This has to be curtailed. And I...yes, the retailers are responsible to a certain point, but the young people have to be responsible also. And I believe next year we will try to address that situation too. We tried this year, but that bill went down in smoke. So with that, I would give the rest of my time back to the Chair, or to...I'd give the rest of my time to Senator Cudaback. And I know he's been involved in this. Senator Cudaback is Vice Chair of the General Affairs Committee. Senator Cudaback, would you like to have the rest of my time?

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Cudaback? About three minutes.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Janssen. The amendment's not down here, so it's difficult to talk about something you don't want it is. Of course, that's not hard for me to do, I guess. But it's one of those things that...this bill was here for a purpose, and we thought the purpose was to get some guidelines to the General Affairs Committee. We talked about that earlier in committee, and we thought we had it pretty well solved in this bill. And then...but along comes an amendment that...I think this amendment that's coming down here...I'm supposing here, or guessing what the amendment might sound like or look like...but I think an amendment that would make it one-sided, I'm going to be opposed to it. We all want to justify what we do here, and I guess I'm justifying even prior to an event happening. But I will not support a one-sided amendment. If it's going to attack just primarily the people who are selling the beverages, then I'm opposed to it. If it helps curtail by doing something to the minor who attempts to go in there and break the barrier down, so to speak, then I will support it. But you just can't go in there and make it one-sided where you pick on the establishments. Ninety-five percent of them are doing a great, great job. They do it, they check IDs, they check everything. And they do not want their stores closed. I can't see any reason why a clerk that may be in the store for a week, and he doesn't have any, really, any...might want to say conscience...maybe he doesn't have any...he doesn't particularly care about the business and where it goes...if that person's able to shut down that store or the establishment that sells the alcohol, that is totally wrong.
