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It's totally wrong. Now if the minor goes in there who attempts to do it, is punished, that's one thing. But it can't be one-sided, and I'm against a one-sided amendment.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Now, we'll listen to what Senator Landis has to say here, and I think Senator Landis tries to be fair, and he probably will be fair, but...in his eyes...but in my eyes, a one-sided amendment...here I'm guessing again here; I'm just talking to take up time, I guess...but I'm against it. And I'm justifying my actions, I know. But we have to tackle this problem by picking on the people that go into the establishment and they know darn good and well they're not supposed to go in there, but they go in there with the idea that, well, nothing's going to happen to me anyhow. I get a little frustrated at this. I really do. We've got to do more than slap their hands. We've got to tell them we mean business, and we're not doing that now, I don't think. We've got to tell them we mean business. We have...I've heard stories of 16, 17, 18...19-year-olds going in there and purchasing liquor. We cannot allow this. We cannot allow this.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time.

SENATOR CUDABACK: With that, why, I guess I'll shut up. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. The speaking order is Landis, Janssen, Cudaback, Baker, and Preister. Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature. I want to use the time of the body well and it seems to me on a warm night we can do a couple of things here. I think we're probably five, six minutes away from having an amendment. I wouldn't mind standing at ease. I wouldn't mind going on to the next bill and coming back so that we are doing something productive. I will tell you this, that the language that you're going to see says this. It's going to say 48 hours on the second offense, 15 days on the third offense. It's going to have some language in that would allow for a license holder
