PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Landis. Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature. Being in a retail business is not all it's cracked up to be. There's not that...everyone thinks just because you're a retailer you got all kinds of money. Well, you handle a lot of money but you don't end up with very much. Isn't that right, Mr. Baker? Senator Baker agrees with me. When you have...when you have employees in retail outlets, they turn over quite a bit. You've got people that are always...they come to work for you and it's usually a stepping stone to something a little bit better and I can't blame them for that. I mean they're...people are always wanting to better themselves so they use you as a kind of a stepping stone. That doesn't mean that those people don't have good intentions. None of them really want to go through the problem of selling...selling to a minor. Actually be there is a fine assessed against that person who does...who sells the alcohol too. So, you see, they...it's costing them, it's costing the retailer. If it's just the fine, it's still quite a bit of money. If it's the fine and closing, that's almost devastating, especially if that is your primary business. In the grocery business, it's just one more product that you're selling. You do keep open. You're able to sell other products. You have to close the liquor department if you're assessed that type of a penalty. Another thing that comes into being is the operations that the State Patrol...that the State Patrol pulls which I refer to as the sting operations. Well, some people don't like to call them stings, but actually that's what they are. Just recently, the Liquor Control Commission was chastised for denying some of those sting
