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operations. It was my understanding, I had not...I have not seen the individual, but this particular individual, I understand, looked like he was about 35 years old. Nevertheless, nevertheless, they should have probably had him sign the book or checked the ID closer. What people are...and these operations are usually...usually tried when that person or that retailer is at the busiest time of the night or day, and I don't know. I have some of my...some of my associates have said that it's a form of entrapment. Maybe it is; maybe it isn't. That's for you to decide or me to decide. I do believe, though, that this type of an operation should have a different...have a different kind of a fine to it. I don't like that practice, I never have, and I...and most of the...a lot of the...a lot of the penalties and fines have been on those individuals that have come in, in those type of operations, and posed themselves to be someone much older. You never see some five-foot person coming in with pimples on his face trying to...trying to buy that alcohol. I doubt very much if they'd ever take an individual like that. So, you see, they're all...retailers are not bad people.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR JANSSEN: They're not bad people. They don't want...they don't want to see young people have alcohol because the stakes are too high for them. This is an increase. This is an increase on the...on the penalty for selling to...selling to underage people. Right now, the way with Senator Landis's amendment, would be a fine. First offense would be a fine. Second offense would be a two-day suspension and fine. Third offense would be a 15-day suspension of your license. Now that's pretty hard. That is pretty harsh, but if we can get the other...if we can...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...get the other...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Schmitt (sic). Senator Cudaback. Senator Cudaback waives off. Senator Baker.
