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it's a no-win situation, so we typically simply have to let them go. They run out the door, hop in a car, take off. We call the local law enforcement. It's ten minutes or whatever before they get anybody up there. We may have gotten a license number on them, but the kid's gone. So I, like Senator Cudaback,...

SENATOR COORDSEN: Time.

SENATOR BAKER: ...would like to be able to address the minor issue. Thank you.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you. Senator Preister, please.

SENATOR PREISTER: Thank you, Honorable President. I was listening to Senator Baker's comments and I wasn't real clear on one point. Senator Baker, you were talking about having Senator Hilgert fill out the book and in the time it took Senator Hilgert to fill out the book, the house could have been cleaned. Were you saying that Senator Hilgert is a little slow? I just wasn't real sure on that, but that wasn't the reason that I wanted to comment. Senator Cudaback had made a number of statements about young people and needing to be more stringent on young people, and I believe Senator Baker was beginning to echo some of those comments. It seems to me that we should not coddle young people but, at the same time, I think we need to appreciate the awkwardness of the position that we put a lot of young people into. When we get to that magic age, which at this time is 21, young people reach what we in our western society generally view as a right of passage, and that's based upon legal age and now you can drink. Alcohol is something you can legally consume and a lot of people wait to that age. They certainly did back in the old days when I was nearing that age and probably when some of my senior colleagues were nearing that age it was the case at that time. We have created something of a mystic around alcohol. We have glamorized and glorified the effects and what that consumption can do. If you look at, historically, the advertising that we have portrayed to society in general, but young people in particular, that they are more confident when they've had something to drink; that they are more whole and complete. They are certainly more appealing to the opposite sex when there's alcohol there. Everything goes better, not with Coke, but with alcohol. And so on one hand
