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we're sending this message of glamour, of adulthood, of responsibility, of maturity, we're sending a message through the consumption of this drug, legal drug for many but illegal for some, sending that message that it's a good thing, it enhances much of your life and at the same time, we're saying, ah-ah-ah, but don't touch, don't consume, this is only for adults. And as soon as we send that message it just makes it all the more appealing. It means that it's then a part of that right of passage, an opportunity to do one of the things that adolescents are doing in growing up, and that's challenging and testing authority, testing their limits, seeing what they can do, what they can get away with. And so we create a situation, we adults, we the responsible ones, the mature ones who should be in charge and in control of these things, setting those limits, we are the ones that send the mixed messages. We are the ones that allow those mixed messages and I think it's the adults, those mature of us, who need to also set those limits. And it's also those of us, who are the adults, who should be the ones that have the more harsh consequences. Certainly I agree with Senator Cudaback when he says we need to hold the lawbreakers accountable no matter their age. I concur fully. However, the bulk, the majority of the responsibility has to be on the adults,...

SENATOR COORDSEN: One minute.

SENATOR PREISTER: ...who are the ones who set the limits, who are the ones that create the laws, who are the ones that need to be in the positions of control and responsibility and limit setting. And if we aren't able to do that, how can we ever expect, with these mixed messages, with the glamourizing and glory that is portrayed by the consumption of alcohol to these young people, how are we ever going to expect them to deal with it when they are not fully mature, when they are still going through that adolescent testing of authority? We, the adults, we, the shopkeepers, we, the retailers, we are the ones that need to assume the bulk of the responsibility and I think that's what we're attempting to do in this legislation. I appreciate, Senator Landis, the great compromiser, coming through once more and bringing parties together...
