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Senator Chambers when he disputed taking away their driver's license for buying liquor. I know they shouldn't buy liquor at all, they certainly shouldn't drive while they're drinking, but buying liquor in itself has nothing to do with their driving. To me, it's just like if you shoot a deer out of season we could give the penalty for a juvenile will lose your license, so I don't think that's the penalty we should have. But I do think we do have to come up with a penalty that is a substantial enough penalty that will give them...will be a deterrent for them for attempting even to purchase liquor. I realize that I don't think we can come up with something very quickly this evening to decide what that penalty be. I think it'll take a little study to do that. So I don't think we should do it off the cuff, but we certainly should be thinking about that. I yield the rest of my time to the...

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Senator Engel. Senator Cudaback, please. Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature. I just suggest that we stand at ease until the amendment comes down. People will have a chance to look at it. It will be here as quickly as it can, but, frankly, that's where we are. This happens in a session. Why don't we just recognize that's what's going on, stand at ease till the amendment gets here. That's my suggestion to the Chair. Thank you.
