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floor the varieties of situations that might fall within those kinds of words. As you know, when you're trying to do this kind of thing you have to use different kinds of descriptive words, none of which are precise. And so I am content to allow DEQ, through rule and regulation and through the process of time and experience in a variety of situations, to come to some level of understanding about what that would mean. I think you and I have the expectation, and I don't expect there to be any problem with that expectation, that they're not going to go out on any sort of crusade to bring in 300-unit operations. Mean, my God, if they can control the rest of it in a reasonable fashion, that would be a good job well done and probably all we need to do. So I expect them to be reacting primarily to complaints and we...it's almost like court litigation. Over time you'll have to...we'll have to see what they are calling high potential and how they try to define it, and if we're not satisfied we'll need to change those words.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay, thank you. Well, I assume that we're going to use practicality and reason on this, but I just want you to understand, most of the body, most of us in agriculture understand, but even now we've got high water tables and we've got live creeks. We've got live waterways that haven't run water for years. Last two or three years in my area we've got live creeks in waterways. You can't get in. You can't cut the saplings out. You can't cut out the willows. You can't mow them. You can't do anything. It's live water. And if you have an operation that it used to be a half a mile away from a live water discharge, you now have potential discharge into live waters of the state under that...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...definition. Those are the kinds of issues I'm concerned about as we get into this. Years fluctuate. I saw the other day that we've gained a half...on the average across the United States we have about a half inch of rain more across this United States than we had, I think it was, 10 or 15 years ago. And so, in spite of the warming climates, warming trends and so forth, all I'm saying is conditions change and I want to have it on the record that I would hope that DEQ understands those things. Because I will say agriculture right
