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chemicals, the man-made things that we're using, we're using on and poisoning our birds, wildlife, fish. So I think that...I think we're trying to restrict...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Time.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...a little bit too much. Thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Kremer.

SENATOR KREMER: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members of the body. I listened to the discussion and with somewhat frustration, because I think we're all concerned about the direction that agriculture and livestock production is going, I think, as well as a lot of other things in our society, maybe our small towns and the schools. And we hear about it a lot on the floor, that it's becoming big factory operations with the corporate entities that are operating them and I, too, am concerned about that. And I think we try to give direction to it. We cannot always stop it. We can't change it. We could give it some direction. And I'd just like to share a little bit, just personally, from my standpoint of my frustrations. We operate a family farm which a few years ago would have been considered probably large. We feed around 1,500 to 2,000 head of cattle, just my son-in-laws and my daughters, myself, and I think that's small. We're a mile from town. We have never had a complaint. The farm has been in the operation for four generations now, which is approximately a hundred years, and I think we care more about the quality of our water and whether we pollute the streams and the odor more than anybody else in this body because it's part of our life and we want to pass it on to the next generations in better shape than what we received it. So it concerns me a lot that all at once now, after a hundred years of doing the best we can controlling the...diverting the water around the feedlot so we don't have water running through it, we have dams to control it, we use that water from the runoff to irrigate crops, and now to have laws to say that we have to have an engineer come in and tell us how to do it and a lot of restrictions that cost us a lot of money. To me, I think 300-head exemption is even too small. I tried to think within 15 miles of me if anybody that had 300 head of cattle on feed and I can't even think of anybody that small. That's about two pens of cattle and I never have
