there have been a lot of injuries. And I'm appalled at the speed that these watercraft can attain. It's like, and I told Senator Schimek just a minute ago, that's about like going 65 mile an hour on one of those things is like going 30 mile an hour down a hill on a roller skate. Now I...I hope that this helps. I really...I really do and, Senator Hilgert, I will support the committee amendments but I just want...I wanted to let the body know the problem that we have on small bodies of water with these...with these machines. Never ridden one, probably never will, but when you sit along a small sandpit and watch those things come around those corners and throw out those big waves and get too close to the banks or the edge of the water, and they're all...a lot of times there, the lakes will go down and then there are...then there are sandbars that you can't see that are underneath the water. Man, if you hit one of those hunks of sand going 65...65 mile and hour, my goodness, I don't know how anyone could ever survive something like that. So it's a problem and the officers at the Fremont Lakes have concerns about them. Now maybe we are on the right track. I hope we are because I'd hate to see someone get mangled like the situation that Senator Hilgert has brought forth to us. That's just terrible, terrible...terrible way to get hurt and it's usually young people. I'm not too sure if we shouldn't put a limit on the age of the people that can run them. I've (inaudible)...I have seen some very young people running, riding these machines that I certainly would not...I would not let my children, grandchildren even attempt to run one of them in a confined area like that. It's a little different when we go to Minnesota in the summer occasionally and on those huge lakes up there, there's not much chance of, you know, running into someone. They stay away from the...I don't know what Minnesota's laws are, but it seems as though they never get too close to the edge of the...edge of the lakes. So with that, I just wanted to voice my concerns about the whole industry. I know that it's a recreational pastime for a lot of people, but I just want...I don't want to see anyone get hurt that seriously.
