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the amendment actually doesn't make any sense to me or add anything to the law anyway, because any money that...if Senator Chambers' argument is correct, that these people are circumventing the law or violating the law, any money that comes into a law enforcement agency that's forfeited is subject to our constitution anyway. So why do we need to say it? What will happen, I fear, if we pass this amendment, is this. If...if people pay attention to the law, if they pay attention and...and I say that sincerely because I'm under the impression from some things I've read in other states they have tried to change this process and the war on drugs is so intense and it is so difficult and it is so frustrating, these people aren't lining their pockets. They're out there trying to stop the influx of drugs into our schools and into our state, into Nebraska, and to do that is very, very difficult, but it is a mission that they believe in. And if you don't think that they don't have to...to work very, very hard to get something done to have any impact whatsoever on drug enforcement, then we're not living in the real world here. The law...the law on the federal level is helpful to throttling the influx of drugs into our country and into our state. It is a law which is more favorable to enforcement than the laws of the state of Nebraska when these agencies work together and cooperate, and let me give you some examples. In our area, we've had a multicounty drug enforcement effort. I think it has involved Sarpy County, Douglas County, Saunders County, Butler County, I believe Cass County. There may be another county or two as well, maybe Dodge and maybe Washington. And...and those multicounty joint efforts, in cooperation with federal authorities, are able to investigate, They're able to get indictments, they're able to get forfeitures, and all of those enforcement agencies work together in that respect. And federal law says that when drug money comes through the federal court system that the Attorney General of the United States and the Secretary of the Treasurer (sic) or the Postal Service, as the case may be, is authorized to retain that forfeited money or to transfer such property on such terms and conditions, let me emphasize that, on such terms and conditions and he or she may determine: one, to any other federal agency; two, to any state or local law enforcement agency which directly participated in any of the acts which led to the seizure or forfeiture of the property. Now we got Nebraska here, which says...which says that we don't care if
