you've cooperated with us, federal government; we don't care if you've supported us with your resources and your confidential informants and whatever other resources you have available to get at this...this drug chain. We've gone through federal court because the burden of proof isn't as great. The burden of proof is on the criminal, the accused, to prove that the car wasn't used in this drug activity. We've had the backup of the U.S. Attorney General's Office in prosecuting, who is a professional and has professionals at his disposal that are...I used to be a county attorney. Those people are much more capable of nailing a drug offender than I was, or than...than any...than most county attorneys in the state of Nebraska. We've been willing to use those resources. But now, if some money comes back from the federal government as a result of the seizure and the U.S. Attorney or the...the Attorney General or the Secretary of the Treasury says, we're going to give you back this money but we'd like to see some additional dogs for sniffing drugs, we'd like to see some additional investigations done, hire an additional drug investigator, whatever, and we say, oh, by the way, we can't do that because, even though we went through federal court, we used a federal process, we used a U.S. Attorney, we used the federal investigators, we used their confidential informant, I'm sorry but the state won't let us do that. We have to...we have to use this money to support our schools. And then I wonder how much activity and cooperation and effectiveness we will have in these cooperative federal, state, local drug investigation ventures. Senator Chambers says it's circumventing the law or violating the law. I say it is utilizing the federal law to apprehend drug offenders and to apprehend and seize drug money, cars used in transporting drugs, and I'm all for it. Because we can use absolutely all of the help that we can get. Now, those people still have the benefit of the constitution with respect to any conviction for any crime, but I think, with what we've seen in drug activity and what has happened with our young people, that we should be very cautious about...about throwing cold water on drug enforcement efforts, and I believe this will do that. I may be the only one here that believes that, but I believe it very strongly, and this is the process. This is the process. Senator Chambers has used this process many, many times. If he believes strongly in something, he will go to the wall for what he believes in. I believe in this very strongly and I am willing to adopt the
