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goes to those common schools. The other 50 percent goes into this County Drug Enforcement and Education Fund Board. And who is on the board? The county attorney and three representatives of law enforcement agencies who shall be appointed by the county attorney. One representative shall be from the county sheriff's office, one representative shall be from a city or village police department within the county, and one representative shall be from the State Patrol. Now, if you've got this board established and it's loaded with law enforcement people, why should not the money go there as intended? Because each little agency has been told, work with us and you can keep all this money and none goes to the schools. That's what Senator Bromm doesn't want to deal with. That's what I think the rest of us see as one of the key issues here. Law enforcement would still get 50 percent of the money, but it would go through this board, which the...

SENATOR SCHIMEK PRESIDING

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...board is required to make an accounting once a year of their expenditures. All that is done away with. There is no accounting now. There is nothing to say what this money goes for. And the U.S. Attorney or somebody had said that every drug dog in the state had been purchased with this money. That's not true. A lady called my office and she had purchased two dogs at least, one to sniff drugs and one to sniff for bombs. So they don't even tell the truth when they talk about the purchases made with this money. But we don't have to study any of that. We're talking about enforcing the constitution as it exists now; that constitutional provision said the Legislature should pass whatever laws are necessary to carry those provisions into effect. We thought we had done so. We find out that law enforcement has found a...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...way.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Chambers, your light is next, so you may continue.
