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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I will.

SENATOR REDFIELD: You and I have had a conversation about this very issue and we have talked about the importance of dealing with something of this magnitude in the correct way and making sure that we do it right, because we are dealing with a constitutional issue and we both have a great deal of respect for the authority of our constitution in the state of Nebraska. And I don't have to ask him to agree with that because I know that's true.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR REDFIELD: You made a statement here this afternoon to the effect that you were not in agreement when this constitutional amendment was first placed on the ballot and that you actually opposed this amendment, and I am curious as to what your arguments were at that time, why you opposed it? And if, in fact, you have changed your mind, if you now support it only because it is there or because you have changed your mind, that it was the right thing to do and that we should leave it as it is?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, if I could get it out of the constitution, I would. I'm not for these forfeitures. I'm not for any of that kind of activity. I don't like the constitution cluttered, but since it is in the constitution it should be upheld. The lawsuit that I brought against Omaha was to compel them to enforce a law that I fought against in the Legislature. I thought it was inappropriate. But I also said, now that it is the law, it should be enforced. They were not enforcing it. I filed a lawsuit against the mayor and the chief of police and I won. I won and they had to pay my legal fees. So, since this is what the constitution says, then that's the way it should be done. What I am really opposed to is any money that's in the nature of a fine, a penalty, a forfeiture, or these business fees going anywhere but to the schools. If there's going to be anything that creates money of that kind, I think it should go nowhere except to the schools. Then, if there are other activities that should be funded by the state, appropriate money out of the General Fund.
