was there then. Believe me, I am not happy that...that I'm the one standing up here talking about spending this kind of money for this kind of a need, but this is reality. We have children who are committing crimes that are more and more serious. They are not appropriate to be at our current facilities that were not designed for those purposes. They need a greater level of care. They need more time. We can't put them in facilities that are revolving doors. The other thing that's happening, and it's happening to counties, is that, out of frustration for the system in that we don't have this kind of facility, youth are being placed outside the state in other facilities that are far more expensive and that we can't monitor, that we really need to bite the bullet and get down to the fact that this need is here and it's not going away. I wish it were. I've had a conversation off the mike saying wouldn't it be nice if we could put this into prevention and wouldn't that be important, and certainly it is and I certainly will be one of the people who will support those things in this body and I know the rest of you will too. But we have youth that are inappropriately placed and that need specialized services that hasn't changed since 1993 and the law you passed that was very similar to what the amendment is before you, and I would be happy to come back with more specific language on Select File if you choose to advance this. But these needs continue to exist. You want to know, I have the classification documents and these are examples of level five offenses that would qualify for placement in this facility: arson, first degree; arson, first degree attempt; arson, third degree, I'll go...there are like six or seven arsons; assault on an officer; assault on a confined person with a deadly weapon; probably seven or eight assault classifications; carrying concealed weapons; child pornography; cocaine, seven ounces or more deliver; cocaine deliver, I know I'm not a lawyer or a law enforcement person so I'm kind of murdering all of this I think; various offenses for...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One minute.

SENATOR THOMPSON: ...crack cocaine; robbery; sexual assault; theft. There are a variety of offenses that qualify in a classification system for kids to need this type of a facility and, unfortunately, we need this type of facility. That was determined in 1993 by the Legislature, but, due to a floor
