SENATOR BOHLKE: I would think that it restates exactly what the constitution says is the authority of the Coordinating Commission. And the committee was very careful on that. And those other areas that move out beyond what...that we're talking about, time lines, how quickly you get back those kinds of details, those are the ones that everyone came to an agreement. The Coordinating Commission was there, the university was there, state colleges were there, community colleges were there. So as far as, is it softening the authority that's given in the constitution? No. If you would ask the Coordinating Commission are there things in there that they would rather not have, you know, the turn around time, there might be some other issues that they would have preferred not to have to do, but it was agreed upon in a compromise, with all of them present. But the overall authority of the Coordinating Commission, I believe, is in the constitution.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay. And looking forward I heard Senator Kristensen characterize this as a short-term horizon, in this case, and looking at the longer term this summer and fall, what do you anticipate looking at in that longer term as it relates to what you have in the committee amendments, or maybe there's no direct connection.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Senator Kristensen and Senator Brown both brought issues to the committee that we said we would address in an interim study, actually taking one full week of what we traditionally do two weeks on K-12, on higher education. It goes to the governance...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay.

SENATOR BOHLKE: ...and some of those issues on how...if we should have one super board, some of those issues that have been raised before.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay. Not so much directly with the Coordinating Commission, except as how it might fit into that big picture once you look at governance?

SENATOR BOHLKE: If...if...once you look at governance, yes, how
