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the other one. I think we have the right model in place. But, if you want to know about that policy choice, the Coordinating Commission will give you the information. If you want to know about what it costs to educate kids in universities and colleges in other states, you can get that information from them. There is a wealth of information that they provide to us on an ongoing basis that I think you would find very valuable as you try to make broad policy choices in many different sets of circumstances. I think they have provided an invaluable service to us.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator. There are no lights on. Senator Bohlke, did you wish to close on the committee amendments?

SENATOR BOHLKE: Thank you, Madam President, members. And thank you for those who expressed an interest. I want to assure you that the work that the Education Committee did, as we discussed this and came back around, and especially Senator Peterson, as you're aware, would use as our way of looking at the criticisms, were they justified or not, we're going back to the constitution. And we very much reaffirmed the Coordinating Commission's authority that is set forth there, obviously we have to, in the constitution and, as Senator Wickersham said, really looked at some of the reports that have been given. And I think by going through this process we were able to at least eliminate, not totally, but eliminate some of those issues that seem to be differences, maybe even stronger than differences, they were stronger than differences, between the institutions and the Coordinating Commission. But that's probably always going to happen. You know, there are going to be, when are they crossing the line? When are they going too far? When are we weakening their authority? When are we not giving them enough authority? In the end, I think, by the numerous revisions to this and the communication we had with all the parties, that we eliminated some of those issues that were out there, that we got everyone to refocus on what is in the constitution, and that some of the things that we were able to address that the Coordinating Commission was willing to do as far as shortening up the time to respond to the institutions and allowing the institutions to refer as to where they may find the report rather than duplicating it, may really, in the end, help improve
