currently. We have a citizen legislature, and we don't want the salary to be such that it means that people are just coming here to do it for the salary. On the other hand, we need to be able to have people, especially younger members who are in those years of their lives when they need to be establishing themselves, have the opportunity to serve and to continue to have that...their input in the process. And just since I've been in the Legislature, just in the four, little over four years that I've been in the Legislature, I have seen some members that I think are very fine members who had to make the choice, and at least partly the choice was a financial consideration about whether they could maximize their earning potential by doing something else and give this up. And so we...I don't want to see it get so high that we're not a citizen legislature, although I think we all have to recognize the amount of time that we put into it. And for many of us, at the level that we're at right now, even though we do receive our expenses, which we need to thank the people who fought for that very hard, we still lose money. I mean, we still...it still ends up being a proposition that we are not making a great deal of money in this endeavor. And it's not just for ourselves, but it is for the institution itself and having a diversity of opinion and having people who may not be in the enviable financial position that some people are that can elect to do this and not have to worry about the consequences to their family as a result of making that choice. And so I really believe that this is something that is a critical institutional issue, and we really must address it, and we must address it, I believe, right now. I think either of the choices is a possibility. I prefer the commission. I would also point out the situation that we have with all elected officials in our state. Our Governor is the lowest paid governor in the nation. We adopted legislation last year to address it. That legislation was vetoed. So we have a situation where elected officials in this state...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BROWN: ...are some of the lowest paid in the nation. And it's not just us; it is our other elected officials. And I don't...I don't believe that that serves the people well. When the Governor of our state could be the head of the Wheat Board
