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what has happened at the federal level, to allow, to bring us up-to-date, I guess. So you can say it's a federal mandate, but that's kind of what it is.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I would...I'd like to ask...I'm trying to get a framework and I know the rest of you may not be interested but I'm going to be bold on this. Senator Jones, I'd like to ask Senator Jones one more.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Jones, would you, Senator Jones, respond to a question from Senator Wehrbein?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I...maybe he's busy.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Jones.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I'll catch him the next time around. Thank you. We're...I'm running out of time now. I will...I'm going to punch my light in again and do it because I don't...I think we're about out of time. He gave me a minute warning. I'm just going to shut up and sit down, but I...I really need the case made for me as to what changes we're making in policy here in a simplified form, and the only reason I'm bold enough to do this is I find I'm not alone on this floor in trying to understand why we have to do...why we should do this, maybe we don't have to, but why we should do this...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...in contrast to what we have now. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Senator Schimek, would you like to be recognized on FA202?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, yes, Mr. President, members of the body. I did say no first, but as the discussion goes on, I think we're going to be on this particular segment for awhile,
