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so I might as well stand up and say a few things. And, first of all, I want to say that I've been on the committee every year that this bill has come before us and it is a very complex bill, and I certainly can understand the confusion that it might cause, and I would also like to say that I think Senator Brown has worked very, very hard with different constituency groups, once the bill came out of committee, to try to address concerns and problems that the different constituency groups have. And I think that, you know, we may not have all the problems addressed yet. I think part of this does boil down to philosophy and Senator Beutler has expressed very well, I think, some of his philosophical concerns. But it is my understanding, and this is why am supportive of the bill and the committee amendments and the Brown amendments and so on, it's my understanding that there does have to be a revision in state law, that there does have to be a means by which housing authorities can operate because the federal funds are going to diminish. They are not going to be there in the same amounts that they have been before. And some of the...some of the concerns that are being raised I believe are already in state statute, that the housing authorities can already do some of these kinds of things and have been doing some of these kinds of things. For instance, I know that in Lincoln, the Lincoln Housing Authority has had projects with mixed incomes, and they have been very successful. Part of the strategy for dealing with low-income housing has changed over the years and we no longer think it's necessarily a good idea to put all the low-income housing in one spot or have all one income level in that particular housing unit; that it is better to have scattered site housing and it is better to have mixed incomes in that housing development. And some of the problems that are typically associated with housing developments then go away. Senator Beutler and I had a little conversation off floor here about how it would be much better, maybe, to give housing allowances to people and not even have housing authorities. Well, I think that would take a tremendous, a tremendous shift in the way we've been doing things and I don't see that coming at the federal level, at least not right now. And maybe he's right, maybe that is a better approach, but for right now, I'm not convinced that that will work. And I know that the needs in rural communities are particularly strong. In fact, if I might share with you, I don't think Senator Brown would mind, at one point when some of these agreements weren't being worked out,
