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other things that have taken place with counties that we have to recognize that it's going to become difficult. And I guess the point that was made, and you probably certainly recall, was that we're, in a sense, the one that...we are really the ones, but in some sense we are the ones that causes this expense. Would you agree with that?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes.

SENATOR VRTISKA: And so the question then comes back, who should pay for it? And I, as you know...as you well know, I supported this bill simply because I thought it was probably a more fair way to do it. At the same time, I will accept the fact that it's a...could be a large expenditure of money, could be more, could certainly be less, and depending on what kind of a action we take on some legislative resolutions that are out there, how this may, in fact, affect future amendments that might, in fact, be coming forth outside of what the Legislature, themselves, does. So I just wanted to make that comment and I appreciate...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And...

SENATOR VRTISKA: ...your bringing the fiscal note forward and people have to recognize it, so...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And I do think your comments are legitimate, Senator, because we did have a lot of constitutional amendments on the ballot last time because of the Constitutional Revision Commission, primarily, so...

SENATOR VRTISKA: Well, and I'm glad you brought that up. That's the point I really got up to make, was last year, because of the constitutional amendments that we were involved in, we did have and probably an extraordinary amount, that we may, in fact, not have for some time but, again, there's no guarantee. But I just wanted to point out the fact that this was...these numbers that Senator Robak has passed out are certainly probably, if you'd go back, other years, they didn't come near that much on an ordinary year. And, again, I have to accept the fact it could happen again, but I'm just...I'm just trying to make the point that this was undoubtedly an exceptional year in
