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student-based occasions. So all those issues have been percolating. The last time this issue almost came up, there was some discussion and some elements of an agreement but not among all parties. The elements of agreement that I recognized were these, the Project Extra Mile, and PRIDE of Omaha agreed with that portion of the liquor lobby that Mike Kelley represents and with the Creighton representatives that we could package three ideas together. Although aware of this, the retailers were not part of that agreement. I think they were there and they heard it but there was no agreement on their part, so I don't think that they are bound by whatever the terms of this amendment are, although they certainly did want the book to be added. I had a conversation with Senator Janssen on our way inside. He said he thought that book piece was important. I said I'd put it in the amendment. I think that they are two separate understandings; one was PRIDE, Project Extra Mile, Creighton, and a portion of the liquor lobby, and then a second one between Senator Janssen and myself to support these three ideas simultaneously. Now, frankly, Senator Janssen isn't crazy about this I am sure but, and he has filed a kill motion in the event this amendment gets broken apart and the critical sections, as far as he's concerned, aren't adopted, and I think that's entirely legitimate. That would mean that our understanding had not been kept and he would not be bound by that if that wasn't kept, so I think those are all the pieces on the table. Let me describe the amendment. It has three pieces to it. Number one, it says, for a second offense of selling to minors or overselling that occurs in a four-year period of time, the Liquor Control Commission has the discretion to stop the sale of alcohol in that premises, in that premises only, I might add, for 48 hours; that with a third or subsequent offense within four years, then there is the possibility for the discretion of the Liquor Control Commission to run for 15 days. That's the piece that I most care about. That's what I came to get in this whole fight. Secondly, Creighton has pointed out that although they have an arrangement with a contracting agency, a Marriott Company, who comes in and does their alumni dinners and that kind of thing, that it's a food service arrangement, that they have to get an individual license for each and every one of these adult, I stress, adult occasions, and that it would be easier if they had, as the law would under more normal circumstances allow them to have, a license that would allow them to have a premises used
