the power to buy themselves out of their offenses, to reduce it to a number of days and then to simply pay a fee, and it's entirely possible that these fees could be, depending on how much they are, either too heavy for a small operation, or not particularly much of a disincentive for a large operation. This, of course, follows exactly the size of the institution. Big businesses will miss two days of sales. Small businesses will miss two days of sales. And, by the way, it is missing sales, not being closed down; by the way, it's second offense, not first offense. Jim Jones will tell you, if you ask him off the floor, that he's been told by one of the lobbyists that my amendment kicked in at the first offense and that it closed people down, neither of which is true. I'm surprised that a paid lobbyist well into the Select File debate wouldn't have read my amendment, but it's possible. Mistakes happen. It kicks in at the second offense only, and thereafter, and it is discretionary and it closes no one down. What it says is, the license that you have to sell liquor...

SENATOR CROSBY PRESIDING

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...is in temporarily...in temporary abeyance. The book, I think it's reasonable in this context. The Creighton situation is not permitting alcohol in the presence of students. It is for adult activities, university activities like alumni events, fund-raising events. This is the tool the Liquor Control Commission has asked us for for the last three years and I ask for its adoption. Thank you.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Landis. (Visitors introduced.) For the debate on the Landis amendment to LB 127, Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Madam President, members of the Legislature. Last Wednesday evening when we were debating this same issue, we came to a compromise on an amendment. It doesn't satisfy everyone. It does not satisfy the supporters of the amendment and it doesn't support (sic) all of the people associated with the retail sale of alcohol. Just a few things that I want to point out what have happened in the past. In a
