period 12 months, the violations which were handed out, I'm talking about grocery stores right now and convenience stores, 100 percent of those violations were due to compliance checks. That tells me that minors are getting alcohol from other sources, such as older friends or stealing it or getting it from their homes, and when a person comes in, a young...a minor, when they come in on a compliance check, they are not fearful of being prosecuted because they're working for, in this case, the State Patrol. They know that if they get caught, it's not...they're not going to be subject to the penalties that we do have in place, which is, I believe it's a \$500 fine and/or three months in jail, and that's pretty severe. But you never see one of those...out of that 100 percent in 12 months was from compliance checks. You don't see any of those young people being subject to this. We talk about the fines for a minor, we talk about that a lot. You know, we need to do something to deter the minors from trying to procure alcohol. I think we have...I think we have in place, the penalty, the fines, they need to be enforced. I don't want to cause undue hardship to young people any more than anyone else does, but some of these cases, it would be for their own good. To my friends in the retail business, it was your desire to be involved in the liquor business, and when you do that, you have to play...you have to accept the rules that are set down by the Liquor Commission and the Legislature. We have to do all we can, as legislators, and as retailers, to see to that our children do not fall by the wayside because of our misdoings. The amendment as it is, as is written, was a compromise, as I said, between people, some of the people, not all the people, in the retail liquor trade, and I gave my word to Senator Landis that I would support it in its present form. If it's changed, that's a different story and I believe Senator Landis alluded to that. In the future, we're going to, and I don't know why it's taking so long, to get our driver's license with a magnetic strip on the back that can be ran through a scanner that each...that each retail establishment should have, and it will tell you exactly how old that person is. If this is the problem...
