me that the people who are voting against the bill would say, well, let's adopt this amendment. And what's the rationale? The rationale is to kill the bill. It's not to get this idea passed. And that's problematical. It seems to me that if there is an amendment here, particularly which the Legislature has rejected on General File, pick another bill another day. On the other hand, Senator Hilgert's entitled to this shot. I would just urge you to vote it down, and I'll tell you why. While you may want to get everything you can, I will tell you this, that if you overreach in this case, you'll wind up doing nothing, which is exactly what the retailers and the liquor lobby wants you to do. They want you to come up with nothing. And that's the ultimate outcome if we adopt this amendment.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Landis. Further discussion on the Chambers amendment? Senator Dwite Pedersen.

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor, members of the Legislature. Just a little bit of history. What Senator Hilgert's doing here...I carried a bill three times to do exactly this. And taking driver's licenses away from minors for possession of alcohol, I do would...do believe it would have some very definite effect on our minors' use of alcohol. Prohibition didn't work, so we have to do what we can with what we have. And I heard what Senator Vrtiska said; basically the same thing. It's here. I believe and obviously, I'm not talking to Senator Chambers' amendment on giving the 39 lashes...I do believe, however, though, that we do take driver's licenses away from adults when they abuse alcohol, driving while intoxicated, driving while under the influence. And I believe kids do learn from their parents, as Senator Chambers was saying, their first words. But we're forgetting part, and that is, kids learn an awful lot from their peers, too. And if a peer has learned this, something bad, a bad word, and brings it and teaches the other kids, the kids have always needed to be important and be part of something with their peers, so they pick it up, too. It has a lot to do with the behavior of young people. And the loss of driver's licenses is one of the things that would get teenagers' attention. I do not believe in any of the physical abuse that Senator Chambers talks about. You shouldn't have to go around hitting people. But you do have to teach respect. And respect, most of the time, comes
