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through some kind of a consequence and some kind of an understanding along with the teaching. And I believe this: taking away the driver's licenses for minors in possession of alcohol will have direct results on how many kids we have maimed and killed as a result of using the alcohol and driving, getting in fights, and so forth. With that, I'll return the rest of my time to the Chair. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Pedersen. Further discussion? Senator Schrock.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Mr. Lieutenant Governor, members of the Legislature, I'd like to make a brief point here. Certainly, kids come from parents of different wealth. If you fine them, in a lot of cases, the parents will pay the fine or provide the money. If it's a low income family, it's a burden; if it's a high income family, it's nothing. But you take away the driver's license, that's equal punishment. And the parents can't pay the fine. The kid loses the driver's license, period. The parents can't give them theirs. That's the only point I want to make. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Schrock. Senator Chambers, you're recognized to close on your amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'm going to close on my amendment and close in on this issue. Senator Schrock didn't go far enough. He's naive enough to think that a rich family will only pay the fine of the child. He's probably unaware that rich families can hire lawyers and they have connections and their child will not lose the driver's license either, because there are much more serious offenses than that which rich children are shielded from in terms of having to pay the penalty. Now, I'd like to ask Senator Dwite Pedersen a question or two, since he is our resident psychologist, or counselor.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Pedersen?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Pedersen...

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: Yes.
