people are from; I can't, but he can, because he lives down there. But I think that's a suggestion we may use rather than the stickers. So, if you want to make a comment on that, Senator Lynch, I'll give you my time.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Lynch.

SENATOR LYNCH: Well, we're never too old, and it's never too late to accept good advice and recommendations. And what Senator Schmitt, as an old State Patrolman, well, not as an old, but as a now reserved, more reserved State Patrolman suggests is not all bad. What he...what he means is, I'll show you an alphanumeric here that...that it would be a D, right out here, for example, for Douglas. As you can see, this is a plate here that's...it sticks on. I haven't stuck it on too good, but the proposal now is that there would be a Douglas, Lancaster and Sarpy County sticker that would be on that as well. Now the things that you get when you get your license plate, that say it's due in November, December, February, or March, that would still be a sticker that would have to be put on the plate. I could pass these around. This has the numbers first and letters last. Whether you put the numbers last or first, I don't really care, and I don't think most other people do as well. And I hate to suggest this, because I don't want to stir (laugh) or ruffle any feathers, but you know, the possibility exists that once you get one of these kind of plates, like in California, that plate exists for the life of the vehicle that you have. If you're thinking about saving money, think about that. We're not suggesting that in the bill, but that's a possibility. I want to assure my good friend and former good friend of Senator Kristensen, George Coordsen, that really it's not my intention to provide any changes from this at all in the future. Now I might have to run again for another 12, 14 years to make sure it doesn't happen on my watch, but (laugh) on the other hand, I don't think that will happen either. But I would hope that this wouldn't be construed, some time in the future, to force all of the other counties to go to this system. That's why the bill very clearly spells out that, except for the three counties mentioned in the bill, it doesn't apply to anybody else, but it offers the option, should counties want to do it for whatever reason. I...I think it's one of those things whose time has come. And I know in Douglas County, with the number of branch
