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service offices, for example, we have...trying to store the right numbers in the right places, you know, for prestige plates and other plates that people are used to having, it causes, very much causes administrative costs and also storage problems for us.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR LYNCH: I...not...I didn't really answer Senator Schmitt's question regarding whether or not or how it should be designed. I do know there are a number of things that can be done, and that can be done in the future, should this bill be passed in its present form. And what he suggests is something that probably could be considered.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Lynch. Senator Bromm.

SENATOR BROMM: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor. I just want to say that Senator Lynch and others who worked with us on the bill worked hard on this. And we really had virtually...we've had no virtual opposition. There was one individual at the public hearing, an individual from Douglas County, who expressed a desire to keep the plate that he had always had, and he'll be able to do that, if he wants to get a personalized plate. We've tried to accommodate those people who are concerned about having to do this in counties other than this. We've tried to accommodate those that wish to know what county that car is from with the sticker arrangement. I just think it's a very practical bill. I do not...I guess, Senator Schmitt's suggestion, although it's interesting, it seems to me you would lose your efficiency and economies of what part of the main thrust of the bill is, and that's to have these plates that are manufactured and available in all counties that would have the alphanumeric system. Now, if you had to have a D, or an L, or a...what's the other, P? S, is that how you spell Sarpy? S, of course, you would lose that economy and that efficiency that we'd be able to accomplish with the sticker. So I...I guess I would encourage Senator Lynch to keep the format of the bill as it is. With respect to...I probably shouldn't address Senator Coordsen, because I, too, may become a former friend. But I...or maybe he doesn't...maybe I never was, I don't know. But in any event, I understand his concerns. But, gosh, the...the
