Coordsen, but I didn't think they were valid. This bill makes it possible for the counties that want to do this to do it. It doesn't require any county choosing not to do it to do it. I see no drawbacks with this amendment and I hope it will be adopted, and what means the most to me is that the license plate will last for the lifetime of the car, which in my case is at least 13 years.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Further discussion, Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor and members. There are, the way I understand this, the three counties will be Lancaster, Douglas, and Sarpy County. Now, am I right in assuming that those license plates that are issued to all three of those counties can be stored in three different places and they can, if one county would run out of plates or need more plates, then they can get plates from...from another county and...because there is not one specific set or set of numbers for each county. Senator Bromm, could you answer that question? Am I right in assuming that?

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Bromm.

SENATOR BROMM: That is correct, Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: So if...so if Douglas County is running short on plates, they can call Sarpy County and say, we're going to need some more plates; can we get some from your depository where you have your plates at? Is that...

SENATOR BROMM: That's right.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...is that correct?

SENATOR BROMM: Right. And...could I add one...

SENATOR JANSSEN: But then...but then the...then will it be mandatory that they put the sticker underneath designating what...which county they are in?

SENATOR BROMM: They would have to use the sticker of the county
