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SENATOR KIEL: Oh, boy. I think probably it's similar to dealer's plates.

SENATOR SCHMITT: Be good for the year, for ten dollars?

SENATOR KIEL: Yeah, I believe so. We're going to take a look at it real quick, but I think it meets pretty much the same standards as a dealer plate does.

SENATOR SCHMITT: Okay. I guess I would have to oppose this too, from that standpoint. You're giving an individual here a plate for ten dollars, dealers, I think, are considerably more than that, like maybe \$250. And I think there is permit, not for cars, but we may be able to do this with a permit. A dealer plate on a truck, you can get a permit to use that for 24 hours for \$10. And I think maybe that may be to address this particular situation for repossession, if the guy can get a permit, maybe, from the state for \$10 when he repossesses this vehicle, to use it for 24 hours, or 12 hours, or whatever it may be. But it looks to me like here you could be opening the door where this person could drive this thing for a year anywhere he wanted to, any time.

SENATOR KIEL: Did you want me to respond to that?

SENATOR SCHMITT: Yeah, would you comment on that.

SENATOR KIEL: I guess, I would say that anybody, if it's...if they so choose, can certainly choose to break the law. What I guess I'm looking at here is those people who are law abiding who would follow the statute and who are trying, to the best of their ability, to do what's right, and that's what this...this change is intended to do. You're right, anybody can use fake license plates, wrong license plates, stolen license plates, dealer plates, you name it, to illegally drive a car. But I guess what I'm looking at is directing this toward people who are willing to obey the law.

SENATOR SCHMITT: But here he would be obeying the law, because the plate is good for a year. And it doesn't restrict him to anything other than demonstration purposes or anything like that. Well, I could tell you I was taking it over to
