SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. I want to be sure and put my light back on, so I won't be out of the loop. Members of the Legislature, Senator Quandahl used the remark that in a nutshell the point he was making, and he went on to make it. Then he talked about an Attorney General's Opinion, which appears to have emerged from a nutshell. Now, if I were to give the credence to the Attorney General's Opinion that Senator Quandahl wants me to give, he wouldn't be getting expenses right now, because the Attorney General said that's unconstitutional. And I disregarded the Attorney General. The Governor vetoed it because the Attorney General told him it was unconstitutional. I was able to persuade my colleagues, maybe there's a little bit of greed involved, to override the Governor's veto. The Attorney General knew he was wrong and wouldn't challenge the law, but he told DAS not to honor my vouchers. So I told him, if you don't do something, I'm going to hire a private lawyer and get this in court, then he took it to court, and we won because the law was not unconstitutional. Senator Quandahl is a young man, he's a neophyte, just got in the Legislature. The Attorney General can beguile him, and the title Attorney General probably blows him away. So to work in concert with such a powerful general, I can understand would be dazzling. But when he refers to people who don't hold the particular individual in that office in high esteem, he could have turned around and said, I'm speaking specifically of Senator Chambers, and I would have said, amen, brother, preach the gospel, tell the truth and shame the devil. And we would have been on good terms still. Now, the Secretary of State is a political animal, the Attorney General is even more so. Those opinions that Senator Quandahl gives that name are really propaganda, politicized tracts, t-r-a-c-t-s. They are not well-reasoned legal opinions. The Attorney General thought partial-term...I meant late-term abortions, thought that law was legal...was constitutional. All my colleagues voted for it, except me. And the judge quoted from me in striking the thing down as unconstitutional. Term limits, the Attorney General loved it, and then when time came to apply it to himself, he said, well term limits ain't so good now, and he ran for a third term. And again he was wrong. Those things that he supported were struck down. The red letter law, scarlet letter, he loved that, struck down, unconstitutional. So the title, badges and titles don't mean
