SENATOR CUDABACK: Are there any objections?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: I object.

SENATOR CUDABACK: The debate will continue on the motion to bracket. Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Excuse me? Did I have some time left? I yield the rest of my time back to the Chair.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schimek, your light was next. That's why I recognized you. You waiving? Senator Quandahl.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: I rise, Mr. President and members of the body, in support of Senator Redfield's indefinite bracket motion. And the reason why I do that is probably for a couple of different reasons. But the first, most important is, is that she read from the Constitution on the floor of the Legislature. And as such, I think she's the second person to do that, so I'm in good company. Third, and probably most important, I think to bracket this indefinitely is the thing...is the right thing to do, because it'll give people a chance to look at the issue and, if they come to a different conclusion than I've come to and Senator Chambers has come to, than Senator Redfield has come to, then there always could be a separate motion to unbracket the bill at that time. But until then, I support the bracket motion of Senator Redfield. Senator Redfield has read our Constitution, I've read the Constitution, and I'd urge everyone else to read their Constitution and come up to their own opinion. Thank you.
