Peterson, and they may do it. But when they do, they will have started a process that won't be over with your amendment because before we've ever implemented the bill we've begun to make special exemptions and to treat somebody differently than somebody else and that always gets us in trouble. The best way to resolve the Board of Educational Lands and Funds argument is to simply reject Senator Peterson's amendment and reject Senator Landis' amendment and then you don't have to listen to me either. It works out both ways.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Wickersham. Senator Engel on the Chris Peterson amendment to the amendment. Senator Engel.

SENATOR ENGEL: Mr. Chairman, members of the body, it is very tempting to follow through with what Senator Wickersham just mentioned. But I do agree with him. I think in Senator Chris Peterson's amendment I think we are kind of narrowing things down and kind of picking and choosing. I think if we pick out the airports, I have an airport in my district, too, and I'd like to protect their interest; but the thing is we start picking and choosing airports today, then tomorrow there will be someone else coming in, someone else coming in, and someone else coming in and where do we stop. So I do not support Senator Chris Peterson's amendment. Thank you.
