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PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR BROMM: Senator Chambers, the reason it's there is that this is the federally acceptable definition. I don't know if it's drinkable in some form or not drinkable, and if I...I don't know that it's a problem to take it out. I'll be glad to check that, and I would like to check it before we take it out and if we can take it out, I'll even be willing to pull the bill back to do that, if you would like me to, but I...I don't know the answer for sure.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And here's the concern. I cut grass for elderly people and I use a power motor, and I go get gasoline at the filling station and I...the can I set in the...right next to me so that I can make sure that it doesn't splash or tip over. If there were ethanol...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...in one of those containers then...okay.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Tyson.

SENATOR TYSON: Yeah, thank you, Mr. President. I...to clear up a couple of things, number one, you can take ethanol if you're very, very careful and you can extract it because of the difference in vapor points between the two...two substances, one of which is gasoline. That's what's used to denature it, at least at Cargill, I believe. But the vapor points, I believe, are so close together...alcohol is 170 and I'm not sure what gasoline is. It could be about 130, 140. You'd have to do it very, very carefully and it wouldn't be worth...wouldn't be worth the trouble. It would be easier to make up your own mash and go from there. Senator Bromm, I call your attention, however, the reason for which I arose. I call your attention to page 2, Section 2 of your amendment which states it's unlawful for any person in the passenger area of a motor vehicle to possess an open alcoholic beverage container while the motor vehicle is located in a public parking area or on a highway of this state; and number three, except as provided, it is unlawful
