he just hands it to somebody, it's not a problem. And I agree with Senator Chambers on the commercial vehicles. I've had people comment, well, we want to go to the football game in Lincoln on Saturday, and we charter a bus, and we're coming over from Omaha, and we're driving down the interstate, and we all want to have some alcohol. That's fine. I worked security at the stadium, for several years when I was with the patrol. Then you have the problems with them after they get to the stadium because they've had too much to drink that they consumed on the way over. SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Schmitt. Senator Bromm, on the Tyson amendment.

SENATOR BROMM: Thank you, Mr. President. I just wanted to clarify a couple of things. First of all, the bill came out of committee with the language in it that Senator Tyson is trying to put back in, but the body made the choice, on General File, to take that language out. Consequently, I...I'm going...I'm not going to vote on this amendment. And I'm going to certainly accept the decision of the body. I did want to clarify something though. Senator Tyson, would you yield to a question, please?

SENATOR TYSON: Yes, sir.

SENATOR BROMM: Senator Tyson, when you gave your opening, I thought I heard the word...I thought I heard you say that with your amendment you wanted...you thought it was okay for people to consume alcohol in charter buses or motor homes.

SENATOR TYSON: No, what I said was the language contained in the second portion of that amendment, which is to say self-propelled motor homes, or cabin trailers, as defined in Section 30-301,...
