said, no, we do not have drinking because it's against the law to drink on the highways in the state of Nebraska. And we've had those who fudged on it and said it was all right. This law, I believe, makes that consistent. It's important that we pass the bill the way it is, because people need to know what the consistency...that they have some consistency in their laws. And I have not been lobbied on this by the liquor companies, by the transportation companies, or anybody. So I don't see them seeing that as a big problem. As far as your motor homes go, this law does not say you cannot have an open container in a motor home that is parked, it just says you can't have it in one that is moving. And them motor homes have compartments on the outside that I know they can move things to, to lock them in, just like in the trunk. Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Pedersen. Senator Chambers, followed by Senator Vrtiska. Senator Chambers, you're recognized. Senator Chambers waives off. Senator Vrtiska.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. I just rise just for a moment to oppose the Tyson amendment, simply because I think that what we are trying to do is make it more confusing and make it more difficult, as Senator Schmitt pointed out in his testimony, make it more difficult for law enforcement, in fact, to administer the law the way it is written. And I think that the less confusing we make it, the better it is for law enforcement to be able to carry out their duties that they're hired to do. And I think that the Bromm amendment makes it pretty clear as to what the law is, and I think we should stay with his, and I will oppose the Tyson amendment and support the...the Bromm amendment. With that, thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Vrtiska. Senator Tyson, there are no more lights; do you wish to close on your AM1389 to LB 585?

SENATOR TYSON: Thank you, Mr. President. I...I'm going to utilize just a moment of the close to talk about two things, essentially. Senator Chambers was talking about laws and he was addressing it, and I don't want to misquote him, but he was
