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original task force that looked at this was figure out how to do it. And that was not what happened. And so we may be buying just another period of time when we're spinning our wheels in the same way we have before. Now there are some aspects of the Kristensen amendment that I think are very good. The Section 5, where we're required to all be on the same computer system is absolutely essential. That is the critical piece that Senator Quandahl and I were just talking about. We absolutely have to be together on a system. The other piece that is...that I think is very good is the piece about relieving from the clerks of the court the burden of being personally liable for bad checks so that they can increase their turnaround time. And, yes, that is a critical component, and it's a critical component, not just of the mandate, but of what we should want, because we should want the money to get back out to the families as quickly as possible. And I agree with Senator Kristensen that we cannot pass the bill in its present form because it really has no present form. And that's what brought me to AM1775. But the thing that we seem to not be talking about are the issues that...

SENATOR COORDSEN: One minute.

SENATOR BROWN: ...were raised by Senator Raikes' in terms of the cost-effectiveness of the system. Yes, we need to be absolutely concerned about the...the...the...the customer service aspect and being able to make sure that this system works well. But we should be concerned about the cost-effectiveness as much as the federal government is concerned about the cost-effectiveness. And so that is a piece that we cannot, in my estimation, just turn a blank eye to. And I think that we have very compelling evidence from a very reputable institution, an institution and an individual who did exactly what they were told to do in terms...

SENATOR COORDSEN: Time.

SENATOR BROWN: ...of the framework by the federal government. Thank you.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Senator Brown. Senator Chambers, please.
